## SHOREHAM FESTIVAL

Big news for the fall issue is, of course, the Shoreham Festival! This year marks our 250<sup>th</sup> town birthday, so the Committee selected that as this year's theme. Lots of the usual favorites are back, plus one very special event has been scheduled that coincides neatly with our celebrations.

Returning are garden tractor pulls, and the classic car show, along with the Congo Church' pancakes breakfast and the Selectboard Dinner Saturday evening. Various events take place around the Commons during the day—more food than you can shake a stick at, with apple pies, and Burger Buggy specialties! The Cemetery Tour/Hayride is another returning high-point with re-enactors telling the tales of the cemetery residents.

The Library will have its annual festival book sale, and a story time mid-morning for the youngsters.

The unexpected special event is a scheduled stop at Larrabee's Point by the Lois McClure as she heads out on an inland waterways tour. The McClure doesn't take folks out for rides, but she'll be tied up at the Carillon's dock and open for dock-side tours. She's an accurate full-scale replica of the barge schooners that used to ply the Lake on a regular basis, and something not to miss!

Saturday afternoon is the Parade, followed by the delicious Selectboard Dinner, a street dance, and the best fireworks around—bar none!

So—gals, get your high-heeled sneakers on, and gents, your dancin' shoes—and come to the Festival! Your presence makes it a success.

## Recycling News

On August 10, the Selectboard hired Robin Conway to be the Recycling Attendant, effective August 27. Many folks saw her at the Recycling Center on August 13 as she handed out a list of what is/is not recyclable and explained coming procedural changes. The changes are:

- Cardboard will go into a separate dumpster section from regular recycling
- Bags of recycling will not be allowed to be tossed in directly; Center users will need, for a short period, to dump recycling first into smaller bins, then empty the bins into the large dumpsters.

Because this will slow up the process until we all get used to it, it is suggested that all allow extra time, and note that the following will

help speed up the process:

- flatten cardboard & plastic jugs
- do not include: clothing, garbage, non-recyclables

The changes have become necessary because of the increase in non-recyclables being dumped into the dumpster containers, increased use by non-residents seeking to avoid having to pay to recycle at home, wasted space taken up by bags and unflattened cardboard & jugs. All these contribute to higher costs for Shoreham residents. If not controlled, we may need to move to a fee system rather than pay via the Town budget.

A list of recyclables is available at the Center and will be on the website.

Winter's just around the corner! And, since **September is "National Preparedness Month,"** the usual winter reminders bear repeating:

- Check your heating vents and make sure they stay clear of snow. If *they* can't breathe, *you* may not either! Carbon Monoxide is deadly.

- Keep extra medical supplies on hand, too
- Watch out for snow build-up on roofs—remember all the roof collapse stories from last winter!

## Bridge Work Coming Up

### Rte. 74 Bridge to be closed for 2<sup>+</sup> months

Exact start-date not yet determined, but expect work to begin in September. Plans call for shutting down 74E at the bridge while the deck is removed and replaced with a wider one.

VAOT will be directing traffic to Rte. 125 in Bridport. Note that any ambulance/emergency-assist vehicles normally using 74 to access Shoreham and Orwell, as well as orchards accessing the co-op building will also need alternate routes.

Everyone travelling to and from the Middlebury area will need to allow more time for the trips back and forth.
